

Are you looking for a great paying job but don't want the hassle of earning a degree? Court reporting would be a great fit for you! A court reporter, also known as

a shorthand reporter, is a person whose occupation is to capture the live testimony THINGS TO DO BEFORE LEAVING THE NEST

in proceedings using a stenographic machine, thereby transforming the proceedings into an official certified transcript. A degree for this occupation is not required, but it is still encouraged. In Illinois, a person is required to type at least 225 words per minute using a steno machine. Although 225 words per minute sounds like a lot, with the proper training, it becomes second nature. There are only 22 keys on a steno machine and the reporters type in syllables rather than letters. When becoming a court reporter, you can either work at a courthouse or you can become a freelance court reporter where you are your own boss. The yearly salary starting out in Illinois is up to \$60,000 per year plus money per page of printed transcripts. Stacey Wilson, a 2nd Circuit court reporter, along with Amy Scott, the court reporter supervisor, stopped by WHS to talk about this field and how desperate it is for new people. Court reporting is one of the most needed jobs in the world, meaning that you can find a job for this career almost anywhere. To become familiar with different terminology that might be discussed during trials, biology, chemistry, and anatomy are good classes to take while here at WHS.
